

The theme "I - Body, I - Dance" was realised thanks to the tireless efforts of many individuals. I would like to thank the entire organising committee, the daCi board and our worldwide representatives for their support.

I would also like to acknowledge our partners in organising the conference: Republic of Slovenia Public Fund for Cultural Activities as our local partner, the Ministry of Culture of the Republic of Slovenia and the Municipality of Ljubljana for co-financing the event. Our heartfelt thanks also go to the Ljubljana Secondary Preschool Education, Grammar School, Performing Arts Grammar School, and the Tourism Ljubljana for their hospitality. In addition, I am incredibly grateful to the Cooper-Newell Foundation for their generous philanthropic support that made the daCi registration scholarships possible, enabling many young people to participate.

It is a great honour that the Slovenian National Commission for UNESCO recognised the importance of the conference and granted it honorary patronage. The signing of the daCi Ljubljana Declaration by the Slovenian Minister of Culture and Minister of Education was significant and I look forward to working with daCi members to implementing action for dance education in different parts of the world.

A special THANK YOU goes to Nina, Goran, Urška, Helena, Mojca, Urša, Andreja, as well as my colleagues and the Dean of the Faculty of Education at the University of Ljubljana. Their commitment and teamwork made this event possible and brought together young people, dance educators and artists from all over the world to create the wonderful "I's" we experienced.

According to the registration statistics, we had 65l participants from 29 countries, which we consider a great success. The young dancers' programme attracted 395 participants from 12 countries, while the scholars programme had 256 individual authors and co-authors from 25 countries. We are very grateful to all those who gave presentations and participated in the conference. While it is difficult to highlight all the outstanding moments, I encourage you to visit our website to view the highlights of the event, which will be accessible until the next interim meeting in Malaysia.

In addition, we present to you the feedback from a survey completed by 88 participants. You will find the results in this newsletter, together with the evaluations of our daCi representatives worldwide. Thank you to everyone who gave us their feedback! We can see what you liked best and where improvements could be made. These will be very helpful for the planning of our next daCi conference in Malaysia 2027.

As the new Chair, I look forward to working with both our established colleagues and the new members who bring fresh perspectives to our volunteer work with daCi. I look forward to the year ahead and wish you all a joyful holiday season and a happy New Year.



Message from the Outgoing Chair

Dear daCi friends

It is just months since many of us had the good fortune to meet again face-to-face in Slovenia for a wonderfully stimulating and enriching conference. Like previous daCi conferences, this was another unique experience that brought together young people, educators and artists to dance, share and learn together. This collaborative participation and networking through practice and research is testimony to daCi's ongoing impact around the world.

I am now Outgoing Chair and confident in daCi's future as my colleagues and friends Vesna and Nicholeen ably take the roles as Chair and Chair Elect.

Since my Chair's report presented at the General Council meeting in Ljubljana, I have been reflecting again on daCi's achievements since 2022.

These include:

- delivery of the successful 2024 conference via careful partnership collaboration;
- generous support for young people's 2024 conference participation from the Cooper-Newell Foundation;
- confirmation and plans underway for the 2O27 conference hosted by Malaysia;

- a sliding scale for online membership fee payment and Slovenia 2024 conference registration, aligned with international guidance on varying economic circumstances of world regions:
- improved communication with members facilitated by the new daCi Administrator;
- successful Twinning, Outreach and Research projects involving young people;
- updating of the Constitution to include policy priorities and SpringBoard information:
- publication of proceedings & research outputs that add to the body of knowledge in the field of dance education, aligning with archive management at the University of Surrey:
- ongoing collaboration with UNESCO as 2024 Conference patrons and the creation of the daCi Ljubjana Declaration as guidance for action to support global dance education, building upon UNESCO's 2024 Abu Dhabi Framework for Culture and Arts Education.

Going forward the new Executive and Advisory Board are establishing committees to finalise the new 2024-2027 Strategic Plan which will be shared with members early in 2025. This includes a new process to involve all members in the election for the 2027 Executive Committee. We plan to improve the daCi website and grow daCi's financial status to support donations, gifts and sponsorship plus a new awards program. DaCi will continue to clarify and strengthen its relationship with UNESCO.

I am heartened by the ongoing support from past daCi leaders and that daCi is expanding to become a truly diverse international organisation. This is evidenced by growing representation in Africa, Europe, the Caribbean and Asia-Pacific with new daCi representatives established in Hong Kong, Taiwan and Japan, vital for renewal and development.

With the continuing challenges of climate change, war, economic hardship, and threats to health around the world, daCi responds with resilience and endurance through dancing in our local communities and looking outwards to build a strong global network.

As I move towards my final months as Outgoing Chair, I thank you for your commitment to daCi and ask you all to consider where there are gaps in representation and how you might help grow daCi membership...

Wherever you are in the world, from Summer in Australia, I send you all good wishes for dancing at the end of the year and into 2025!




Ljubljana Declaration

On Thursday Ilth July as part of the Dance and the Child (daCi) 2024 world conference in Slovenia, the Dance and the Child international Ljubljana Declaration was proclaimed and signed by the Republic of Slovenia Minister of Culture, Asta Vrečko and Minister of Education, Darjo Felda, daCi Chair, Jeff Meiners and incoming daCi Chair, Vesna Geršak. In addition, Gašper Hrastelj, Secretary General, Slovenian National Commission for UNESCO attended as honorary patron of the daCi 2024 Slovenia Conference.



The highlight was wonderful, bringing scenes to mind vividly like a story. We've gathered memorable aspects shared by Japan members.

Fantastic "I - body, I - dance"!: The Theme which has clear concept and structure of "I-body, I-dance" left a lasting impression! It was powerfully symbolic, with each "I" beginning creating a memorable and impactful experience! Imagination, Improvisation, Inclusion, Identity, Intelligence and Interdisciplinarity! Inspiring I-OPEN: The collaboration of song and dance was wonderful, absolutely amazing! Seen from above, the dancers were truly like a kaleidoscope. What does it look like from the front? I wish it had lasted longer! Through the words of the song and the dance set to music, we naturally understood the conference's direction, immersing us in the 6 days daCi journey with a powerful message guiding everyone forward. Shadows and dancers moved freely, connecting and becoming one. Dance expressed pure freedom, we can understand the feeling without speaking! I love seeing each country and teacher rise to greet one another, it was a perfect opening, making us feel warmly welcomed as we came together. Beautiful Ljubljana and Venue: The city and the facilities at the University of Ljubljana offered a truly wonderful setting, bringing comfort and warmth to participants.

The I-PERFORM venue, in particular, stood out as an immersive space where the close connection between audience and dancers created a captivating experience. The lighting beautifully highlighted the dancers, enhancing the charm of this unique environment! Vibrant Presentations & Workshops:

I-(RE)SEARCH was full of energy, with participants actively engaging in research and lively discussions. Both the workshops and lectures provided meaningful and fulfilling experiences for everyone involved.

Unique Experience!: I-DANCE FOR PEACE, I learned planetary dance for the first time. Dancing to the beat of drums and songs is a powerful step toward unity. I have had a similar experience before, and I remember being deeply moved. I was impressed by how the natural environment enriched the experience and nurtured a sense of concern for the community and the peace of the earth.



Japan

Insightful Keynotes \mathcal{E} Lectures: The keynote speeches and lectures stood out, reaffirming that this is a space for actively sharing knowledge and culture in dance education. As one teenager noted "The keynote was incredibly interesting" highlighting these sessions as a valuable source of insight.

Discussions among adults also benefit the children they work with, making daCi a fantastic interdisciplinary environment that continually nurtures and inspires young learners.

Focus on the Ljubljana Declaration: The daCi Ljubljana Declaration is a very important statement that presents a vision for the future of education. It builds a shared understanding and emphasizes that dance is a wonderful value that makes a significant contribution to children's education and social development, offering strong support. It was impressive.

Unlocking Synergy 'I-Perform': I was particularly intrigued by the fusion project No. I which combines the silent 'sculpture' and the 'living' essence of dance in the session. The process of dancers drawing inspiration from the deep messages encapsulated by the sculptor and bringing them to life holds great potential for development. The time-based art, which disappears from the moment of the performance, is visually expressed, offering both dancers and the audience a sense of surprise and freshness making it a truly engaging project.

Closing celebration!: Everyone came together as one, creating a sense of unity through shared actions! It was so great! Young people and all are lively and seem to be having so much fun! The atmosphere was lively and filled with joy! I could see that everyone was smiling and feeling fulfilled.

Continuing to explore new inspirations and educational values through dance education as UNESCO for both children and adults at the daCi conference is a truly meaningful endeavour. The highlights for 6 days of inspiring exchanges allowed us to witness the children and young people growing naturally, richly, and powerfully, it's a truly moving experience. We said together, "I truly wish we could have been there!". With heartfelt gratitude for the remarkable efforts of the host country Slovenia, we celebrate the great success of this conference. Springboard impressions







The Young Dancers programme consisted of

- 18 I-research workshops / 27 hours programme.
- Three colour dance workshop groups (Green, Orange and Blue) each divided into three groups by age (Small, Medium and Large).
 Each age group worked for 8 hours and 72 hours in total. The final result was presented at the closing event.
- I-perform / 4 hours programme + rehearsals.
- The I-write and I-shoot programme units ran parallel to the movement activities of the young dancers and the result is the I-shoot video, which you can find in this newsletter or on the conference highlights page.
- In total 99 hours of young dancers programme + rehearsals and I-shoot, write activities.




Conference statistics




Conference questionnaire analysis results


The questionnaire was sent to 36O addresses and we received 88 replies, which is 24% of all addressed persons involved in the Ljubljana conference.


DEMOGRAPHIC DATA






Conference questionnaire analysis results









The conference attracts visitors with the opportunity to gain and share content, meet old friends and make new connections.

What did conference participants like the most?

The answers can be divided into two main groups. The first group refers to a broad reply like "Atmosphere" or a programme cluster like "Young Dancers Performances". The second group of replies highlights individual programme units such as xy paper, workshop, keynote speech, etc. We received 157 responses for highlights, as opposed to 56 for downlights presented further in the article, so we can conclude that positive feelings predominate.

Apparently you have liked everything or many things, so at the top of the highlights table is the phrase 'General satisfaction', which includes 'everything', 'all', 'many things' and similar responses. More specific responses show that participants enjoyed watching performances and actively participating in workshops, demonstrations and morning flavours.

Among the individual programme units, you were most impressed by the keynote speeches by Susan Griss and Eeva Antila / Suvi Honkanen.




What did conference participants dislike?

We have received 56 valuable feedback responses about shortcomings, difficulties, mistakes you encountered at the conference. You were disturbed the most with "the way of presentation", which means that the concrete program unit was not presented clearly due to the language difficulties or technical shortcomings.

Misleading titles is a very subjective complaint arising from a mismatch between the visitor's expectations based on the title of the session and the actual experience.

Very much objective complaints relate to the conditions of the venue, targeting the lack of air conditioning during the summer heat wave we experienced during the week of the conference. Some venues were too small for the needs of the programme units, such as Morning Flavours and Young Dance Performances.

The average marks for the venues are high and in the expected order.

What would you like to repeat on the next conference?

Certainly, young dance performances should remain in the programme and opportunities for participants to move as well. Coffee breaks are highly valued, but not because of the coffee itself, but because it was placed in the heart of the building together with the information desk as an excellent meeting point for non-formal exchange. Other must-haves include a free day and morning flavours, and of course the conference would not be complete without an opening and closing event.

I have currently moved to Malaysia for my new job and in these circumstances I decided to hand over the role to someone who can work closely with daCi Japan members.



Vale Eileen Kramer: a tribute

8 November 1914 - 15 November 2024

With sadness, I write following the news that Eileen Kramer passed away peacefully a week after celebrating her llOth birthday at Bangarra Dance Theatre, Sydney.

Dr Maggie Haertsch messaged us to say: Our beloved Eileen has taken her final bow and off on her next adventure. She left the planet today to catch a star. So look at the sky tonight, raise a glass and cheer her on.

Eileen leaves daCi with entrancing memories of her special presence at the daCi/World Dance Alliance congress Panpapanpalya 2018 in Australia, under the themes 'dance, gathering, generations, learning'. Eileen's artistic spirit shone as she led teachers in a stimulating workshop. This was followed by her captivating performance as part of the final creative sharing in Dance Epidemic at the Royal Adelaide Hospital. Supported by dancer Patrick Harding-Irmer, Eileen danced seated, elegant and graceful, watched by so many of us. Eileen was a lifelong learner and had never forgotten her memories from the earliest years, urging young daCi dancers to "hold on to your creativity".

daCi South Africa representative Lisa Wilson, shared a fond photograph from that time and daCi Japan representative Hisayo Sugao wrote to say 'news of her passing has once again brought to light the depth of Eileen's extraordinary soul and passion'.

I am so grateful that I grew to know Eileen over the next years as she shared many delightful stories and parts of dances from her time as a Bodenwieser dancer. Eileen was also a choreographer, painter, singer and costume designer, publishing articles and books with inspiring stories conveying her life experiences and influences. A world traveller, living in India, Pakistan, Paris, New York, Lewisburg, Virginia, Eileen returned to her birthplace, Sydney in 2013 aged 99, for "the best years of my life".

I feel bereft as I had so many more questions for this kind and generous wise elder. In her eulogy for Eileen, Cathy Gray so beautifully said:

It has been such a privilege to be able to share even the smallest part of your marathon journey in life. You say you have been lucky. But truly, you have also made your own luck. With your endless curiosity, your cheeky wit, and that antenna of your mind, super-tuned to the absurdity and wonder and beauty and grace of the world. You could see the miraculous in tiny ordinary things as well as vast and magical ones. You have sprinkled your sparkle dust over us in a myriad of ways. You have changed us. You are part of us. And we celebrate you.

Eileen touched so many, telling us that she found joy and expression through dance. Her playful, creative, imaginative and loving spirit endures, and Eileen's star shines on to inspire us with her unwavering energy, exceptional memory and infectious sense of fun for life.
